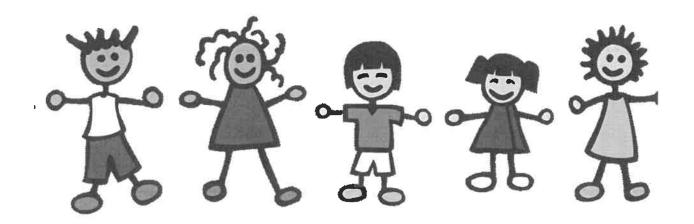
It is almost time to come to Pre-K and we are so excited to see you!

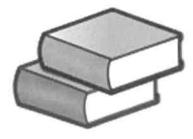
#### Dear Families:

#### **HAND WASHING SONG**

Sung to: Row, Row, Row Your Boat

Wash, wash, wash your hands. Soap will make them clean! Scrub the germs till they fall off, germs go down the drain!



Did you know that reading with your child is a great opportunity to work on developing language skills? The next time you read with your child try practicing these skills based on your child's age.





Expand upon your child's expressive utterance by adding one word. Example: Child says, "kick ball". Adult repeats, "I kick ball."

When using repetitive text, start a phrase and let your child try to finish it. For example, "Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What \_\_\_\_\_"

Work on using pronouns "I" and "me" in sentences. Give models to encourage your child Example: I will turn the page.

Work on recognizing actions in pictures. Name an action and have your child point to it. Example: Which boy is sleeping?

Work on finding items by functions. Describe the use of an item you see on the page and have your child find it. Example: I see something you use to brush your teeth



When looking at a page ask your child simple WHO, WHEN, and HOW MANY questions. Example: Who is driving the bus?

Talk about the characters in the book. Focus on one or two characters. Describe the character's looks. Talk about the actions of the character. Do you like the character or not?

Encourage longer utterances by remaining quiet and letting your child do all the talking. Encourage combining simple sentences with the word 'and' as a conjunction.

Work on increasing the length of your child's utterances by adding descriptor words that include adverbs (ex. quickly, quietly) and adjectives (ex. long, blue, hot)

Practice comparing skills (ex. longer, shorter) and basic concepts (ex. behind, between).



Work on the sequence of the story. Practice retelling with transition words such as, FIRST, NEXT, and LAST.

Find and practice rhyming words in the book.

Work on identifying letter names in the text. Model the skill and see if your child can find the same letter.

Work on grammar that is more adult-like including early irregular verbs (ate, ran, etc.) and articles (a, the.)

Practice more logic-based questions such as WHY and HOW.

Provide opportunities for your child to ask questions that start with "Do you...", "Can you..." and "Are we ...."
Practice giving simple definitions for common objects.

#### **Transitions**

As we adjust to being back in school, we realize the majority of our friends have not been in a school setting, or away from home for a long period of time. To help with these transitions we have provided some recommended tips to hopefully make it easier on our students and families.

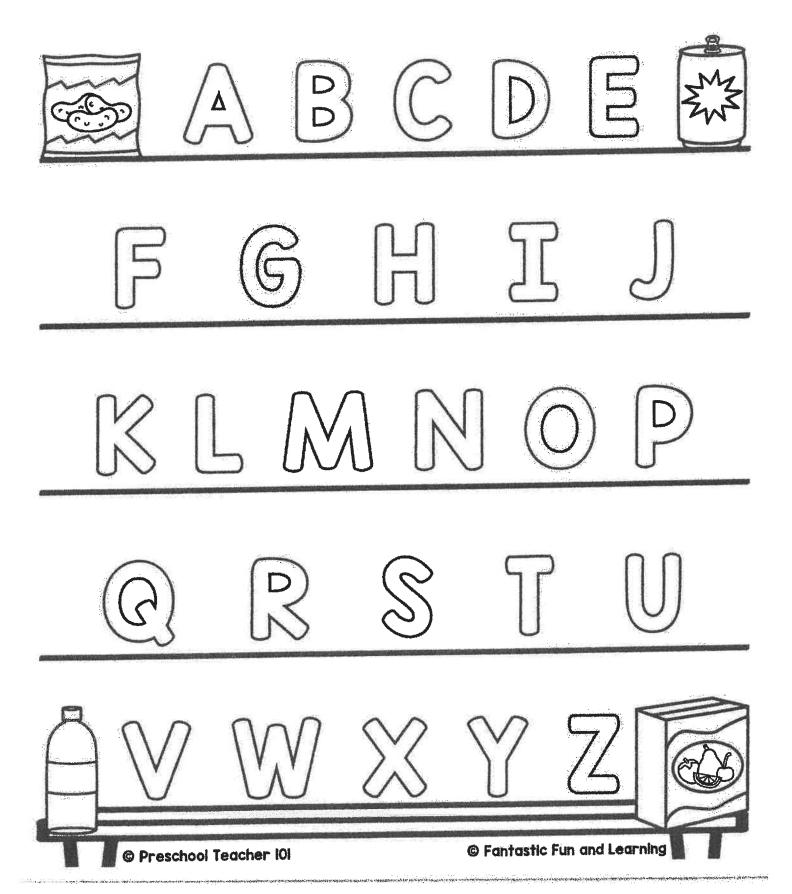
- 1. Leave quickly and do not look back
  - a. the longer you stay, the more reaction time your child has.
- 2. Send them to school however many days they are signed up to attend
  - a. Sending them only two days when they are signed up for five, or sending them only half day when they're signed up for full will delay their adjustment period.
- 3. Send in a family photo to keep in your child's folder.
- 4. Set clear expectations
  - a. Help them understand that you will go to work while they go to school
  - b. Remind them after rest time (or story, whenever it's appropriate in their daily schedule) you'll be back to pick them up.
- 5. Do not bribe
- 6. Be sure they get a good night's sleep, every school night.
- 7. Don't give up, your child will adjust to being in school.

If there is anything else Miss Becky, myself or Ms. Lepore can help ease this transitional period, please let me know. We want to make this as smooth and easy as possible for everyone. If your child is having trouble before arriving at school, message me "Just Keep Swimming" and feel free to email me throughout the day and I will get back to you and let you know how they are doing asap.

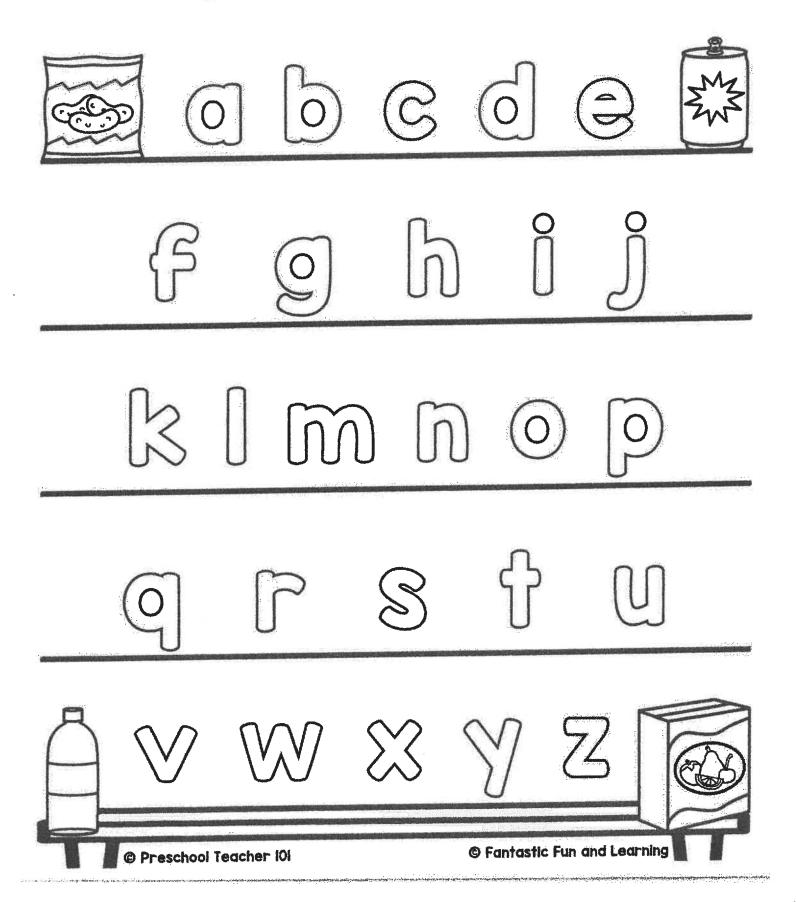
### Pantry ABC Scavenger Hunt
